I devote a great deal of my time to life drawing and watercolour painting but most of my exhibition work was created with an Apple iPad and Pencil, using Adobe Fresco software. This allows me to experiment with effects, colour and composition with the freedom to be adventurous and explore new concepts. My aim is to break into completely new ground, riding on the back of breathtaking technological advances. This catalogue and the exhibition itself is a record of my personal development. Mostly I am inspired by nature, which provides truly random patterns that cannot be produced by the artist, no matter how skilled. I capture images either by photographing or sketching. Eye-catching elements are then selected and are mixed and blended together to create a vivid image that may appeal to the viewer.



I have not sold any of my work previously, it has been created solely for my personal pleasure and for me to explore what new, exciting possibilities can be achieved with the use of technology.

This exhibition provides an opportunity for me to part with my work in a joyous way by allowing it to be viewed by a live audience rather than by showing it on social media, which conveys no empathy whatsoever.

Works of art contain a part of the soul of the artist, and are an expression of experiences, whether these are happy or sad. The viewer may or may not relate to these feelings and react accordingly. Successful art, and music in particular, can be spiritually uplifting to a mass audience, or stir awareness and is very powerful.

In all other respects the purchaser of this artwork will have exclusivity of ownership. No further copies will be printed


Introduction

The exhibition is displayed in themes: Trees, Water, Endangered Species, Herefordshire and Heritage, although they have a common purpose, which is to provoke awareness of our changing environment and human relationships.


This project began when I produced a series of paintings to depict the work of Herefordshire Wildlife Trust in May 2022 displayed at Queenswood visitors' centre. The Trust management kindly allowed me to be involved with one of their live projects relating to the Lower River Lugg and to create work that would reflect their activities and success stories.

Being a keen fly-fisherman for many years I sadly have observed the decline of the rivers within the Wye catchment, caused by the deterioration of ecosystems that support the entomology at the bottom of the food chain. This is has been caused locally by the exploitation of free natural resources for profit. Unfortunately, this does reflect the action of commodification throughout the planet and little is done to prevent it.

My hope is that my work will bring some brightness in this circle of darkness.






















